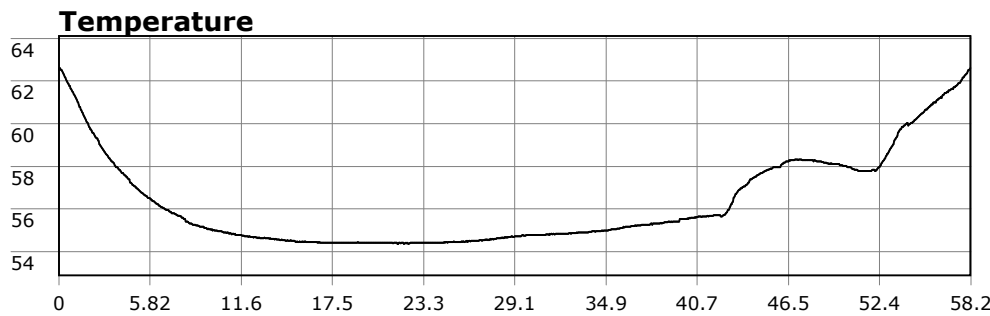

Equipment build: 7mm suit + vest w/hood; two small lights;
14lbs weight; no camera and no pony bottle.

Second dive off the point. Conditions were calm from the trail but a bit more active at the actual entry point (still within reason, however). A good ten divers made their way down and once in the water broke into a few small groups. All made it in the water without incident (at least the ones I saw). Bob took a few of us on, and we dropped down for the usual point profile of exploring the pinnacles and statue and then heading bearing 030 once someone hit 1800psi of air. Once again Bob got us right on the statue, and the exploring began. Vis was in the 15-20 ft range with lots of wildlife. After a bit we headed on a 030 heading for the cove. There was very little current compared to last time so the swim back was leisurely, and the amount of structure on this dive is simply excellent. The group did a good job of staying together and all exited without incident. A great dive.

Plenty of wildlife on this dive to include sheephead (one male this time), many different types of nudibranchs, starfish, senoritas, greenlings, rockfish, perch, sea pens, tube anemones, gorgonians, and the biggest sunstar I've ever seen. It was huge. Like last week, once we got to the cove Bob busted up some urchins for a feeding frenzy.
