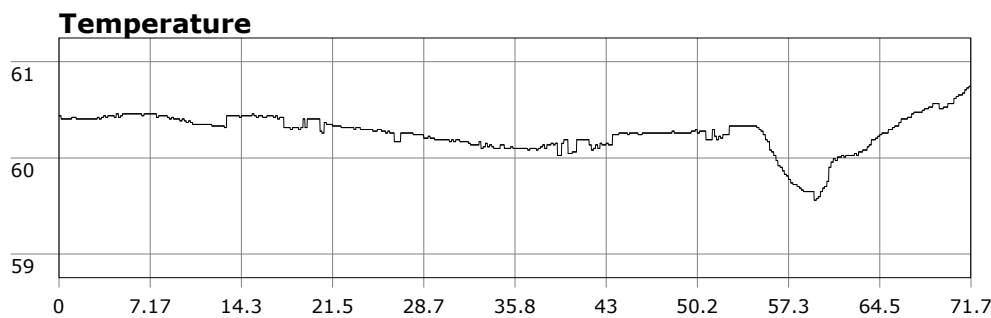

Part 2 after hiding my camera in the bushes after it flooded.

Equipment build: 7mm suit + vest w/hood; one light;
131lbs weight; camera with strobe, spare air

Vis looked very promising. I entered over the rocks, kicked out and dropped down. It wasn't long before I saw a horn shark. I stopped to take a pic when I noticed a small stream of bubbles coming out of the housing--NOT GOOD. Sure enough the housing was partially full of water. Needless to say my combat cam that has been through hell and back was dead. And I got no footage of the best dive I've ever had at Malaga.

Vis was 10-15 feet. I saw many horn sharks, schools of senoritas and other fish. The coolest thing was a rock literally swarming with bugs. Antenna were sticking out everywhere and they were fighting for space. I hung out here for a bit then made my way further west before turning around and heading in. Aside from the dead camera, it was a great dive.
